


Saving Assignments off Blackboard

1. Login to Blackboard using your linkblue username and password.
2. To find your assignments, login and go to the "My Grades" link under Tools.
3. It should bring you to your graded assignments. Your screen may look different from the example here. Click on a course in the left column to bring the assignments for it up on the right:

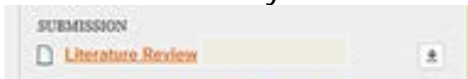

This is a very well thought out literature review. You create a good structure by laying out the four sections in your introduction and then addressing each of those sections. I am pleased that you added a section on the barriers to implementation as well. I thought the Colorado example was particularly telling of how successful these types of collaboration can be, but some of the other examples were less clear to me. Was the Smithsonian project an example of collaboration within a singular institution? I think there needs to be some distinction between collaboration between a group of institutions and collaboration between different units of a singular institution. It seems that the benefits you mention, access to new user groups for example, would be more significant if the collaboration was among a group of institutions. But overall this is very good work. Thank you for your thoughtful contribution throughout the semester I hope you found the course rewarding.
